

- Invisible, artificial barriers that keep men and women
   separated into different sectors, departments and occupations
- Confine women to positions deemed appropriate for them
  - Feminized sectors or "feminine" positions
  - Less prestigious



## WHY DO GLASS WALLS MATTER?





- 1. Limit career advancement of women
- 2. Drive gender wage gaps
- Lead to women's interests being underrepresented in policy
- 4. Render public service less effective
- 5. Slow sectoral growth






- Gen-PaCS: statistics by policy area and government function for both participation and decision-making levels
- First coded ministries into 20 policy areas (Escobar-Lemmon and Taylor Robinson 2016)
- Second coded government functions, following European Institute for Gender Equality (EIGE) categories:
  - B: Basic Function
  - E: Economic
  - I: Infrastructure
  - S: Social Structural




## GENDER, THE ENVIRONMENT, AND CLIMATE CHANGE





The **Sustainable Development Agenda** sees gender equality as crucial to combating climate change




#### Climate change disproportionately impacts women and girls:

- Women and girls are key providers of food, water, and energy, but they
  have fewer resources that allow them to adapt to changing conditions
- Globally, women are more exposed to the effects of climate change, but are less able to cope with these changes


## WOMEN AND MEN'S PARTICIPATION IN ENVIRONMENTAL MINISTRIES, BY REGION












